Vision

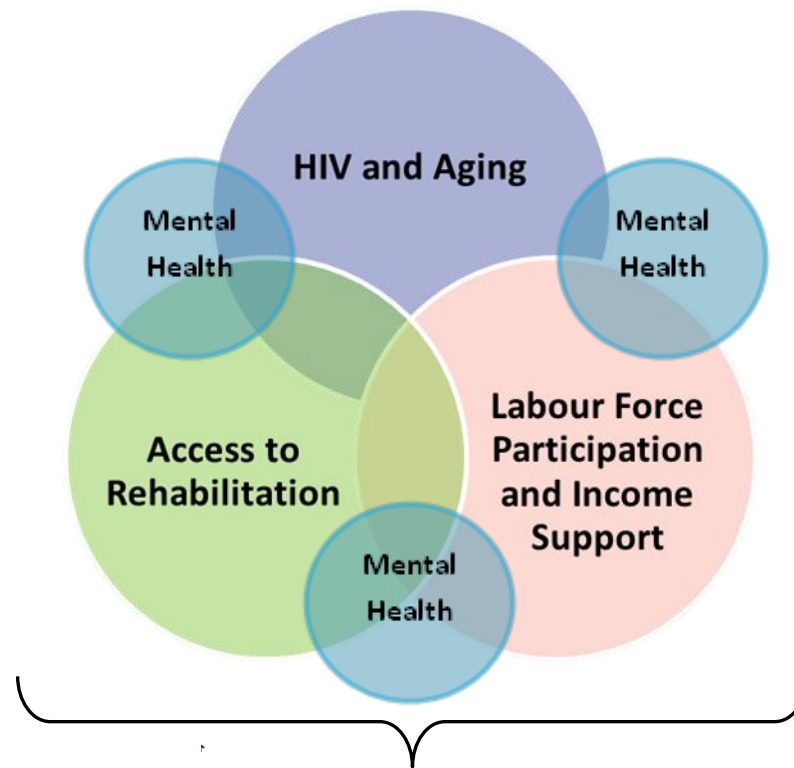
The daily lives of people living with HIV are improved in direct and meaningful ways by rehabilitation care, support and services.

Founded in 2009, an International research collaborative including people living with HIV, researchers, clinicians, representatives from AIDS service organizations and policy stakeholders in Canada and the United Kingdom (UK) with an interest in HIV and rehabilitation research.



CUHRRC Background

- Over 60 members
- Interested in HIV, disability and rehabilitation research
- Partnerships among countries where people living with HIV may experience similar health-related challenges accessing rehabilitation services, social participation issues, income and employment, concurrent health conditions faced by aging such as diabetes, osteoarthritis, and cardiac disease.
- Opportunities existed to bridge areas of research and practice.



Inaugural Meeting, October 2009

Developed an international collaborative research agenda that will address research priorities in HIV and rehabilitation by establishing partnerships with researchers, clinicians, policy makers, and community organizations in Canada and the UK.

2nd International Forum on HIV and Rehabilitation Research, London, Oct 2014



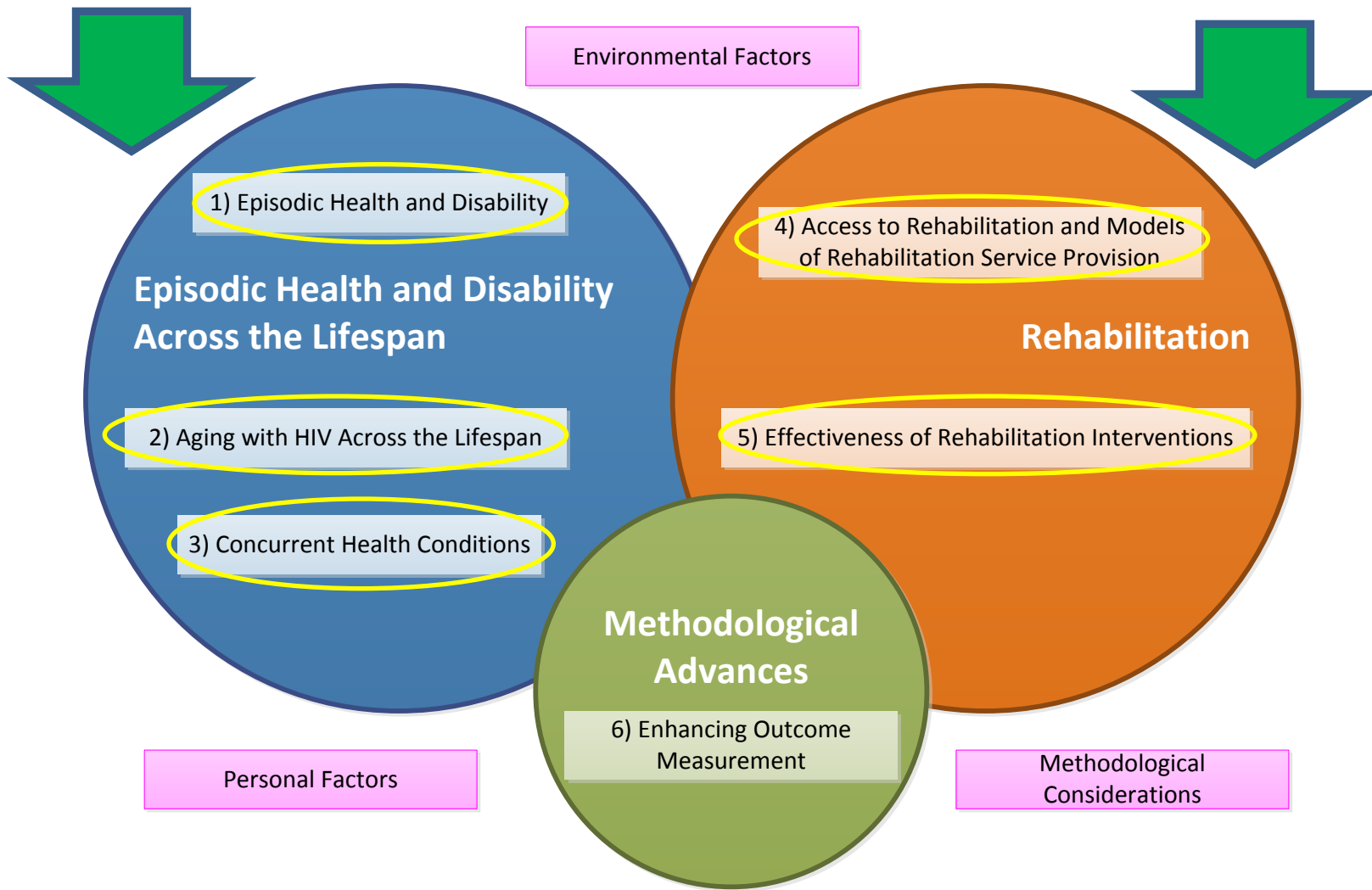

New Directions – CUHRRC to CIHRRC

CIHRRC - International research collaborative based in Canada that includes people living with HIV, researchers, clinicians, representatives from community-based HIV service organizations, and policy stakeholders with an interest in HIV and rehabilitation research.

Membership: members from countries where individuals experience similar issues related to disability and rehabilitation. Includes ‘Chapters’ of member countries that spearhead future Forums and activities.



New Directions – CUHRRC to CIHRRC

Guiding Principles: Forming partnerships and exchanging knowledge among countries with individuals experiencing similar types of disability related to HIV is critical for bridging rigorous and impactful clinical and research knowledge in HIV and rehabilitation.

Research Priorities

1. *Episodic health and disability*
2. *Aging with HIV across the life course*
3. *Concurrent health conditions*
4. *Access to rehabilitation and models of rehabilitation service delivery*
5. *Effectiveness of rehabilitation interventions*
6. *Enhancing outcome measurement in HIV and rehabilitation research*



CIHRRC – New Directions

Strategic Directions & Activities

- facilitating **knowledge transfer and exchange** on HIV and rehabilitation research, clinical practice and service delivery among people living with HIV, researchers, clinicians, educators representatives of community organizations and policy stakeholders in Canada and internationally;
- establishing new and strengthening existing research and clinical **partnerships** in the field of HIV and rehabilitation;
- fostering **mentorship and training** in HIV and rehabilitation research;
- identifying **new and emerging priorities** in HIV and rehabilitation research and practice and;
- establishing a plan for **sustainability and growth** as an international research collaborative to address priorities in HIV and rehabilitation research.
